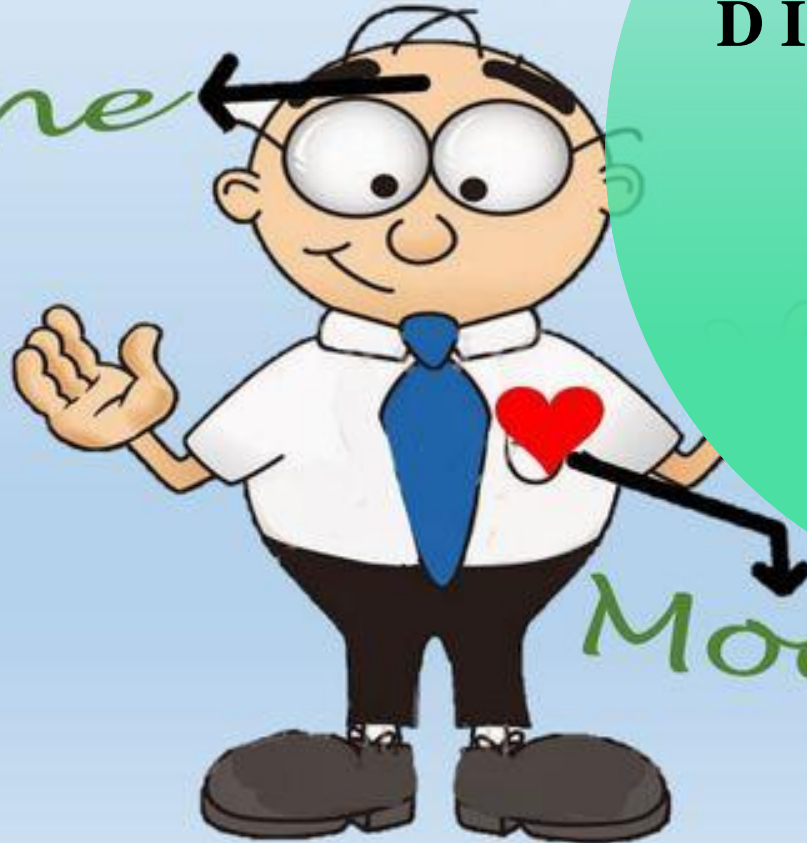


# Tone and Mood

Tone



Mood

- **Tone** tells us how the author thinks about his or her subject. The author's style conveys the tone. Tone is the author's attitude toward story and readers..

- **Mood** is the effect of the writer's words on the reader. Mood is how the author's words make us feel.



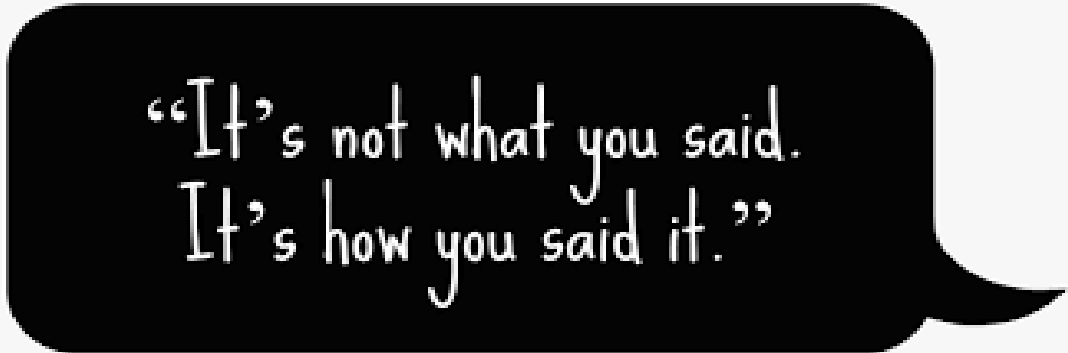
**Tone** is the author's word choice that shows the author's attitude toward the subject. Is there a neutral, negative, positive connotation?

**Mood** is the emotional feelings a writing makes the reader feel. The "atmosphere."

**Identifying the mood and tone helps the reader understand and analyze the meaning of the text**

**Tone must be inferred**

- You can identify the tone/attitude by the language/word choices the author uses.
- His language will reveal his perspective/opinion (that is, whether it is positive/negative/neutral) about the subject.

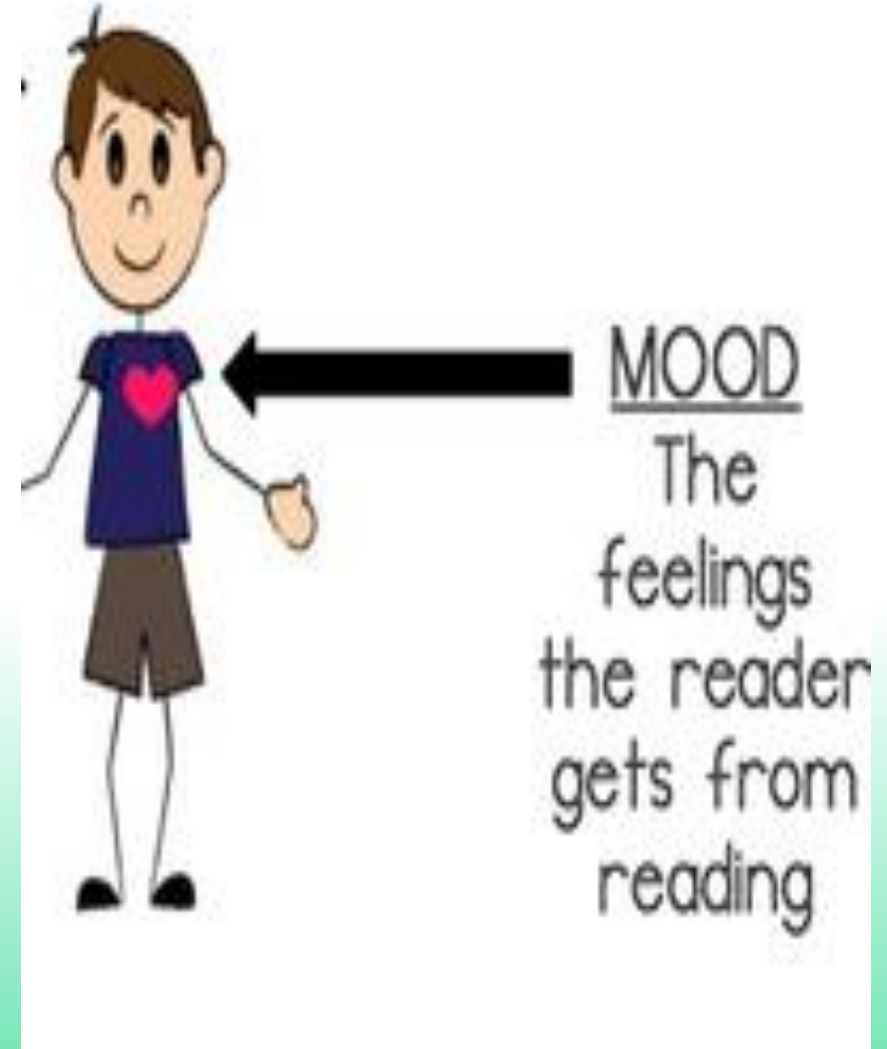
Alarming
