Note for parents and carers:

A noun is a thing, person or idea. An expanded noun phrase provides extra information about the noun. You can use adjectives within your expanded noun phrase to describe and specify details about the noun. Expanded noun phrases build a clearer, more detailed picture in the reader's mind of the noun being described. The expansion can come before the noun or after.







Find the Pattern

A good way of creating expanded noun phrases is to follow this pattern:


The adjective noun with adjective noun.


For example:


You can also add more than one adjective before or after the noun. When you do this, you must put a comma between the two adjectives. For example:








Here is a simple sentence: There are trees in the park.

We can add adjectives before one of the nouns so that it becomes:



There are huge, towering trees in the park.
